Section-A (Reading)

1. Read the passage given below and answer the questions that follow:
 - (1) Physical exercise and competitive sports-especially running, jumping and throwing are called athletics. Athletic events have been popular in all ages and throughout the world. They were a main part of the old Olympic Games held in Greece from 776 BC.

Today, running, jumping and throwing events called 'track and field' athletics hold a high position in the world of sport. Sprinting events are run over the distance of 100 and 200 meters. The 100 meters is over a straight course. The 200 meters usually includes a bend, but is in lanes. Middle distance events are often classified as those between 400 and 1500 meters. The classic old fashioned one mile races also come into this class.

- (2) Races over mile can be classed as long distance events. They are usually run over 5,000 and 10,000 meters. The marathon starts and finishes on a track, but the remainder of the 26-mile 385 yard race is through the surrounding areas. The 3,000 meters steeple chase is run over a track with 28 hurdles and 7 water jumps. The main hurdle events are the 100 meters race over high hurdles. (the hurdles are 106 cm high and the 400-meter race over intermediate hurdles and 200 meters over seventy six centimeters hurdles (76) cm. The most popular relay races are the 4×100 meters and 4×400 meters.
- (3) Field events include high and long jumping, the triple jump, pole-vault, throwing the discus, javelin shot and hammer. Almost all high jumpers now use the flop method in which the jumper twists the body after take off and goes over the bar backwards. In pole-vaulting, the pole is of flexible glass fibre and about 4.5 meters long. The discus is thrown from a circle 2.5 metres in diameter, the shot and the hammer from a 2.1 metre circle. The standard shot weighs 7.26 kg the same weight as the hammer and its steel wire. The women's shot weighs 4 kg.

- (4) Two of the most testing athletic events are the decathlon and heptathlon. The decathlon (for men) is made up of ten events contested over two days. They are the 100 and 400 metres, high jump, long jump, shotput, 1,500 metres, 110 metres hurdles, pole-vault, javelin and discus. The heptathlon for women has seven events-100 metre hurdles, high jump, shot-put, 200 metres, 800 metres, long jump and javelin.

- (1) A newspaper is printed periodically containing public news or comments on public news. It also carries pictures, cartoons, exclusive news stories and comments according to its established policies. In the style of language and presentation techniques, newspapers differ from one another and each one tries to better others with a view to increasing circulation. The main policy of newspapers usually is criticism of authorities, exposure of corruption in high places, and misuse of power and nepotism practised by V.I.Ps.
 - (2) Almost all the newspapers have special columns to publish public grievances and public opinions. A newspaper is a censorer, an advisor and a tutor at the same time. No wonder, authorities fear newspapers more than anything else in the world. Newspapers play a vital role in forming public opinion. In a developing country,

newspapers can play an important role in nation-building. They can play a dual role as a voice of the people and the builder of opinion. But they can achieve these objectives only if the people are educated.

- (3) In India, the readership of newspaper is comparatively less, illiteracy being the main reason for it. Even among newspaper readers, the number of serious readers is still lesser. Most of the people read news items of their interest only. Therefore, a businessman confines his reading to business columns only, as he is not interested to read columns on sports and films. There are some others who read headlines only. There are only a few people who read editorials and educative articles. The newspapers have to play the role of a watch dog of the society. They have to keep it safe from evil influences from within and without. They have to scare the corrupt and anti-social elements. However, in order to perform this duty satisfactorily, they should be free.
- (4) In most of the countries, newspapers do not enjoy freedom. The rulers of the countries where there is dictatorship, autocratic rule, or emergency, cannot afford freedom to the press. They try to clip the wings of newspapers in one way or the other. The Indian newspaper are the envy of the newspapers of such countries as in India, they enjoy absolute freedom of expression.
